

CDL Medical Card and Certification Form

Why do I have to do this?

In accordance with the Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration regulation 49 C.F.R sections 391.41 and New Hampshire law, RSA 266:72-a (II), all commercial motor vehicle drivers are required to self-certify as to the type of driving they will be performing <u>regardless if they are exempt from holding a</u> <u>medical certification</u>. If applicable the driver must maintain a current and valid Medical Certificate on file with the New Hampshire Division of Motor Vehicles (NH DMV).

How can I recertify and or submit a new Medical Certificate?

If your license is up for renewal, please download the Application for Commercial Driver License (DSMV 312). Please bring this completed form (DSMV 312), your Medical Certificate and your current driver license with you to any DMV location.

If your license is not up for renewal, you may choose one of the following options:

- 1. <u>In Person:</u> You can go into any one of our DMV locations with the 2nd page of this form completed, present your Medical Certificate and your current driver license so we can enter the information and scan your card into the system.
- 2. <u>Mail In:</u> Please mail in the completed questions on the 2nd page, along with a photo copy of your Medical Certificate and a photo copy of your current driver license (we must have all three).

3. <u>E-MAIL</u>: Please E-mail the completed questions on the 2nd page of this form along with a scanned copy of your medical card and your current driver license in PDF form (we must have all three).

Please use the following information to help you answer the questions below:

Interstate commerce is when you drive a commercial motor vehicle:

From one State to another State or a foreign country;

Between two places within a State, but during part of the trip, the commercial motor vehicle crosses into another State or foreign country; or

Between two places within a State, but the cargo is part of a trip that began or will end in another State or foreign country.

Intrastate commerce is when you drive a commercial motor vehicle within a State and you do not meet any of the descriptions above for interstate commerce.

If you operate in both intrastate commerce and interstate commerce, you must choose Interstate commerce.

Excepted means that you are not required to have a medical card for one or more of the following reasons:

You drive a commercial motor vehicle for a local, state or federal agency such as a fire department, department of transportation or other government agency.

<u>Non-excepted</u> means that you are engaged in commerce and you must have a current medical card on file.

Please check "Yes" to one of the following questions and "No" to the others:

•	Interstate non-excepted: You are an Interstate non-excepted driver and must meet the Federal DOT medical card requirements (e.g. – you are "not excepted").	YES	NO
•	Interstate excepted: You are an Interstate excepted driver and do not have to meet the Federal DOT medical card requirements.	YES	NO
•	Intrastate non-excepted: You are an Intrastate non-excepted driver and are required to meet the medical requirements for your State.	YES	NO
•	Intrastate excepted: You are an Intrastate excepted driver and do not have to meet the medical requirements for you State.	YES	NO
